MISSION TRIP

MEMPHIS

TENNESSEE

In June, a group from Student Central traveled to Memphis, Tennessee, for a 7-day mission trip. The team, including 35 Freshmen and Sophomore students and 8 adult leaders, partnered with a local church to serve the community and engage in the work that God is doing there. Their activities included serving meals, community cleanup, and immersing themselves in a new city and culture for a week.

Throughout the week, students had the opportunity to hear the stories of those working and serving in Memphis, which led to significant spiritual growth. A highlight of the trip was serving with Union Gospel Mission. This ministry gave students the opportunity to worship with and serve a meal to homeless men in the Memphis community.

The experience of stepping out of their comfort zones—being in an unfamiliar place with no cell phones and away from home—encouraged the students to rely on their friends, leaders, and God. Each morning began with focused quiet time, and evenings included group debriefs. Students returned with a renewed perspective and a deeper understanding of God's work in different communities.











Traveling to a new country with language barriers and challenging physical conditions—including heat, unfamiliar meals, and lack of phones—was a transformative experience for 48 Student Central juniors and seniors, and 12 adult leaders. The group partnered with Casas Por Cristo, an organization that organizes short-term mission trips where participants build houses from start to finish within a week for families in need. This marked our third year collaborating with Casas for an international mission trip.

The students engaged in a variety of home construction tasks, including leveling the ground, pouring cement, framing walls, adding a roof, installing doors, and performing electrical work. The highlight for many was meeting and serving the family for whom they were building the house. While working, local children frequently visited the site, and neighborhood families provided meals, allowing the Student Central group to fully immerse themselves in the local culture.

Mornings began with guided devotionals during quiet time, and evenings featured rooftop worship and reflection on the day's experiences. This week-long trip offered the students profound insights and a deeper appreciation for different cultures, community service, and mission work.

TWENTY NINE

Influence. It's a massive market in our culture today. Print ads, radio spots, and TV commercials have morphed into a technological, carefully crafted, and laser-focused algorithm targeted specifically at us. The influencers who seek to shape our spending habits are, for the most part, motivated by selfish gain. What we buy and do fills their bank accounts, grows their networks, and builds upon their evergrowing spheres of influence.

How did influence work in the early days of the Old Testament? There was no printing press, radio tower, television station, and certainly no internet infrastructure capable of connecting every human being across planet Earth. Personal relationships and word of mouth were really the only options for leveraging one's influence.

Consider the example from I Chronicles 29. God had previously told David that because he was a leader of war and bloodshed, he would not be the king to build the temple. Instead, David's son, Solomon, would be the Israelite king to lead the effort, but there was one problem:

"My son Solomon, the one whom God has chosen, is young and inexperienced. The task is great, because this palatial structure is not for man but for the LORD God."

- 1 Chronicles 29:1

Solomon was chosen, but he didn't have the experience necessary to complete the task. David, who was still king at the time, recognized the gap. As one of his last acts, he catalyzed the Israelites to fulfill God's wishes of building the temple. David's address to the Israelites demonstrated a profound act of influential leadership for the benefit of his son Solomon, but more importantly for the task that God had called them to. King David used the only social network that existed during his time, a national assembly, and gathered together all of the Israelites in one place to speak to them face to face.

David started his speech by sharing what the Israelite kingdom would give to the project:

"With all my resources I have provided for the temple of my God – gold for the gold work, silver for the silver, bronze for the bronze, iron for the iron and wood for the wood, as well as onyx for the settings, turquoise, stones of various colors, and all kinds of fine stone and marble – all of these in large quantities."

- 1 Chronicles 29:2

He continued, describing what he would give from his personal resources:

"Besides, in my devotion to the temple of my God I now give my personal treasures of gold and silver for the temple of my God, over and above everything I have provided for this holy temple:

three thousand talents of gold (gold of Ophir) and seven thousand talents of refined silver, for the overlaying of the walls of the buildings, for the gold work and the silver work, and for all the work to be done by the craftsmen. Now, who is willing to consecrate themselves to the Lord today?"

- 1 Chronicles 29:3-5

Consecrate. It's a word we don't use much anymore, but it was a powerful request that David presented to his leaders and people. He first told them what the kingdom had committed, then shared what he would give personally, and finally asked them to consecrate, or make sacred, what they would give to the Lord and the temple.

The response from the leaders was overwhelming. They gave "willingly, freely, and wholeheartedly" (v 9). It inspired the rest of the Israelites to do the same. David's use of power, authority, and influence was not intended to lift himself up, but to honor God. Unlike contemporary influencers focused on themselves, King David's legacy act was a demonstration of great humility as he pushed all of his chips of influence into the middle of the table and bet on the response from God's people. And it paid off in a God-sized way!

Central Church has been through a number of seasons during its 140 year history. About two years ago when we entered a season of exploring how our church would support space for growing ministries, we prayed and asked God for discernment in what He would have us do. Church leadership explored many options and kept coming back to the fact that in order to carry out our mission, we needed to create more space for people to come and discover the love of Jesus.

With our vision crystallized, the task, much like the Israelites building the temple, was great. We needed the skills, knowledge, expertise, and resources to fulfill what God was calling us to do. The Mission Facility Steering Committee was formed and a host of professional advisors was assembled. Many projects like ours utilize outside counsel when it comes to raising funds. We considered that and talked with professionals who run church campaigns everyday.

However, 1 Chronicles 29 was sprouting in our hearts. The more we read and prayed over the passage, the more convinced we became that it was the path we would follow. Instead of hiring outside counsel, we decided to simply follow God's playbook for fundraising outlined in this chapter.

The financial blessing and generosity of the congregation over the past decade allowed us to follow King David's model and commit \$5 million of Central's "kingdom" cash reserves. We then asked the Elders, staff, and operating board leaders to "give freely and wholeheartedly" and an additional \$4.1 million was committed to the effort.

As we move into the larger public phase of the Mission Expansion fundraising campaign, we as the leaders of the Steering Committee are asking the Central family to consider a simple but challenging question: "Who will consecrate themselves to the Lord today?"

Along with 1 Chronicles 29, other guiding verses have emerged during our prayer and





discernment process. 2 Corinthians 9:7 is a key scripture that demonstrates the posture we have as we come before the Central family and ask for financial support of expanding our facility:

"Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

- 2 Corinthians 9:7

While his ask and influence were critical to the success of gathering the resources necessary to build God's temple, David knew it wasn't about him. His gracious prayer of thanksgiving to God reads:

"But who am I, and who are my people, that we should be able to give as generously as this? Everything comes from you, and we have given you only what comes from your hand...Lord our God, all this abundance that we have provided for building you a temple for your Holy Name comes from your hand, and all of it belongs to you...And now I have seen with joy how willingly your people who are here have given to you."

- 1 Chronicles 29:14-17

David understood that building the temple was not about him, his son Solomon, or the Israelite people. Rather it was about using abundant provision to honor and participate in God's Kingdom work. King David's influence created a cascade of participation and generosity that exceeded all human expectations. It's a lesson in influence that we're grateful to still be learning from today.



CENTRAL CHURCH'S ORIGIN + of OKOS Jeff Wheeler

I was told Pastor Tom Mercer from High Desert Church (in Victorville, CA) was going to be speaking at the church in California where I was an associate pastor. He was going to be talking about "oikos." "Why did we need a pastor to talk to us about Greek yogurt?" I thought. All kidding aside, I had never heard the word used in any other way until this message. And it was life changing.

I'm an introvert. So the concept of "evangelism" (sharing our faith story with others) always intimidated me. It brought back memories of people with bullhorns preaching about Jesus on the street corners at Huntington Beach. Or people handing out gospel tracts to strangers or going door to door and talking to people about the Bible. No thanks! I get hives just thinking about it.

Tom explained that oikos was a New Testament principle for every Christian, even petrified introverts. The Greek word oikos in the New Testament means family, house, or household. It is the circle of people you already have relationships with, not strangers. It's your relational world. In the time of Jesus it included family, extended family, servants, and those who might have helped run a family business. And Tom said we all have an oikos.

My oikos consists of people I work with, go to school with, play tennis with, and live by. In other words, it's those people God has already supernaturally and strategically connected me with relationally.



Now, I don't have a relationship with everyone at my work, or everyone at my school, or everyone in my tennis league, or all of my neighbors. But I do have a relationship with some of them. And that some makes up my oikos.

Tom said it wasn't my job to save people in my oikos. I just had to be myself, and tell the people in my oikos that I was a Christian and how Jesus made a difference in my life. I could do that! Just don't ask me to knock on the door of my neighbor Mike four houses down from me. Again, hives. Be authentic, tell my story, and God will do the rest.

Our story is most powerful to the people in our oikos because they know us best. They sit in the front row watching our lives every day, and they can smell a phony a mile away. But if there has been a genuine change, they know that, too.

In Mark 5 Jesus encounters a severely demon possessed man and heals him. His messed up life gets radically changed. When the man wants to go with Jesus on his speaking tour, Jesus said "no." Instead, Jesus said, "Go home to your oikos and tell them the wonderful things God has done for you and how he had mercy on you (Mark 5:18-20)." When this man spoke lucidly to those who knew how messed up he was, it gave power to the gospel. The people in his oikos started thinking, "If God can help that guy, he can probably help me!"

That day Tom asked us to raise our hand if we came to know Jesus as a direct result of a person we knew (a friend or family member). Maybe they shared their faith, or gave us a book to read or invited us to church with them. Then he asked us to raise our hand if we came to know Jesus by some other means (went to a crusade, heard a sermon on Christian TV or a Christian podcast or just started reading the Bible on our own). 90 percent of the hands that went up were because of a personal relationship with someone. Oikos. That's because oikos is God's plan to save the world. One life at a time through one relationship at a time.

I love the oikos principle because it's natural. It doesn't involve awkward conversations with strangers. In the normal course of my day, with people I already know and am comfortable with, I simply have to talk about what I'm most familiar with...ME! And tell them how a sinful and imperfect person like me could be loved and wonderfully saved by God, even though I don't deserve it. It can happen on the tennis court, at the gym, or across from my cubicle at work. You're not responsible to change THE world. But you are responsible to help change YOUR world. Your relational world. One life at a time. It's called OIKOS.

We all have a story, and we all have an oikos. Jesus asks us to go to our oikos and tell them the wonderful things he's done for us. I can do that. Can you?

MISSION EXPANSION BUILDING PLANS

During the exploration phase of the project, the steering committee collaborated with TSP to develop a master plan for the SW campus. The master plan identified the full potential of the land Central owns at 3102 W Ralph Rogers Road.

Once the master plan was solidified, the steering committee prioritized phase 1 construction plans. They used the lens of "highest mission impact" throughout this process. What would increase Central's ability to help share the love of Jesus? What allows us to open our doors to more people looking for a Savior?

HERE ARE THE PHASE 1 PRIORITIES

1. Next Gen Spaces

We'll build classrooms for weekday Central Preschool & Kindergarten (CPK), Sunday Kid Central programming, and Wednesday night Student Central LifeGroups. CPK & Kid Central will also have new check-in areas where parents can safely drop off children.

2. Worship Center


600 additional seats will be added to the Worship Center. The stage will be renovated, adding an in-stage baptismal pool.

3. Renovated Gym

The current Family Life Center gym will be renovated into a multi-purpose space. Acoustics and equipment will be added so the gym can be used to host large group ministries like Woven and Forged.

4. North Entrance

A north entrance will be added as an additional entry point for weekend services. A parking loop will also be added for Student Central dropoff on Wednesday nights.














MEET LYNN!
